THE CITY COUNCIL MAY ADD AND TAKE ACTION ON OTHER ITEMS NOT LISTED ON THIS AGENDA

NEXT REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING WILL BE ON MONDAY, MAY 9, 2016

The Chehalis city council met in regular session on Monday, April 11, 2016, in the Chehalis city hall. Mayor Dennis Dawes called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. with the following council members present: Terry Harris, Dr. Isaac Pope, Bob Spahr, Daryl Lund, Chad Taylor, and Tony Ketchum. Staff present included: Merlin MacReynold, City Manager; Bill Hillier, City Attorney; Judy Schave, City Clerk; Glenn Schaffer, Police Chief; Dennis Osborn, Community Development Director; Judy Pectol, Finance Manager; Peggy Hammer, Human Resources Administrator; and David Fleckenstein, Airport Manager. Members of the media included Natalie Johnson from *The Chronicle*.

1. Request Ordinance to Allow All-terrain Vehicles (ATV) on City Streets. John Swegle (110 Nix Road, Chehalis) requested the council consider an ordinance that would allow ATVs to be ridden on city streets. Mayor Dawes referred the issue to the city manager and police chief and suggested they get some input on what the merit would be and report back to the council.

Commissioner Gary Stamper reported the county is talking about putting together an ordinance that would allow ATVs to have access to some 35 mph roads in Lewis County. He noted there's a large ATV Club near Mossyrock that he's been meeting with for the last year, adding they're trying to finalize a plan that will be safe and organized.

- 2. <u>Proclamation</u>. Mayor Dawes presented Human Response Network Board Member Peggy Hammer with a proclamation declaring the month of April as "Sexual Assault Awareness Month" in the city of Chehalis.
 - 3. Consent Calendar. Councilor Spahr moved to approve the consent calendar comprised of the following:
 - a. Minutes of the regular meeting of March 28, 2016;
- b. Claim Vouchers No. 115274-115396 in the amount of \$351,443.46 dated March 31, 2016; and Payroll Vouchers No. 38734-38784, Direct Deposit Payroll Vouchers No. 6948-7040, and Electronic Federal Tax Payment No. 158 in the amount of \$781,136.79 dated March 31, 2016; and
- c. Adopt Resolution No. 8-2016 on first and final reading authorizing the city manager to apply for and accept the Washington State Department of Transportation grant in the amount of \$92,500 for the construction to repair the apron, reconfigure the tie-down layout, realign the taxiway, and relocate the runway end identification lights.

The motion was seconded by Councilor Pope and carried unanimously.

- 4. Administration Reports.
- a. Report on Upcoming Text Amendments. Community Development Director Dennis Osborn reported they have a few items to take to the Chehalis Planning Commission for annual review, to include:
 - Rezone request for the old Alaskan Camper site
 - Building code for fence height
 - 2-year State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) exemptions
 - Shoreline Master Program

Mayor Dawes asked if the text amendments would be brought before the council after the Planning Commission does their review.

- Mr. Osborn stated, yes.
- 5. Council Reports.
- a. Update From Councilor Lund. Councilor Lund reported he attended a couple of Recreation Park meetings.

- 6. Ordinance No. 956-B, Second and Final Reading, as Amended Allowing Cannabis Growing, Production, Processing, and Retail Facilities in Certain Zones within the City Limits of Chehalis. City Manager MacReynold reported, at the previous meeting, the council provided some amendments to the ordinance and passed it on first reading, as amended.
 - Mr. Osborn reported the amendments to the ordinance included:
 - Removing Commercial Freeway zone as an allowed use for cannabis retail
 - Adding the retail sale of cannabis to the Industrial zones, in addition to the General Commercial zone
 - Limit the number of cannabis retail facilities to two within the city limits of Chehalis

Councilor Spahr moved to pass Ordinance No. 956-B on second and final reading.

Councilor Pope seconded the motion.

Councilor Harris asked if the word "location" should be added with regard to the number of retail facilities, in case one of the current owners of the two retail establishments wants to open up a second store.

Mayor Dawes suggested "retail facilities" to him would mean the number of locations.

City Attorney Bill Hillier agreed with Mayor Dawes, stating that would be correct.

The motion carried 6-1 with Councilor Ketchum voting against the motion.

7. Ordinance No. 957-B, First Reading – Amending the 2016 Budget. Finance Manager Judy Pectol reported, even with the amendments, all of the funds involved will have equal or higher ending fund balances at the end of the year than previously predicted. She noted the budget amendment includes some carryover items from 2015 and some items for this year, to include the \$80,000 donation from the Chehalis Foundation for the ballfield feasibility study, and a couple of smaller grants.

Councilor Taylor moved to pass Ordinance No. 957-B on first reading.

The motion was seconded by Councilor Lund and carried unanimously.

Mayor Dawes recessed the regular meeting at 5:21 p.m. and opened the work session at 5:23 p.m.

- 8. Work Session to Discuss Recreation Park Improvement Project Schedule, Feasibility Study and Potential MOU with the Chehalis School District. Project Manager Tom Skillings, with Skillings & Connolly, Inc., provided a handout that outlined the discussion on the Recreation Park Project. He reported the council gave direction to proceed with the proposed improvements at Recreation Park (Phase 1), and to conduct a feasibility study to look at possibly relocating the ballfields.
- Mr. Skillings noted, at the February 8 meeting, council asked if levy money could be spent on a different site other than Recreation Park, if they decide to relocate the ballfields. He noted the answer they received from Bond Counsel is yes, as long as it's covered in the project description and stated in the levy question.
- Mr. Skillings reported they're in the process of moving forward with Phase 1 at Recreation Park. He noted they're putting the scope of work together for the preliminary design and are meeting with the design team to get Penny Playground underway. Mr. Skillings indicated they're working to schedule a 'Design Day' meeting with the school children sometime in May to get their input on Penny Playground.
- Mr. Skillings reported they've also moved forward with the feasibility study to look at alternative locations for the ballfields. He noted the city received funding from the Chehalis Foundation (\$80,000) to pay for the study. Mr. Skillings stated the two sites they're considering, in addition to Recreation Park, include Stan Hedwall Park and the Chehalis School District site.
 - Mr. Skillings provided and overview of the two alternative sites:

Stan Hedwall Park Site

- Four 200-ft. ballfields with possibility of two additional 225-ft. ballfields
- Required parking stalls 160 (space available for an additional 400 stalls)
- Space for multiple events

Chehalis School Site

- Four 200-ft, ballfields with possibility of two additional 225-ft, ballfields
- Required parking 160 stalls (space available for additional parking stalls)

Councilor Spahr asked what the 225-ft. ballfields would be used for.

Councilor Harris noted the four 200-ft. fields would allow us to continue the same programs as we have now, and the 225-ft. fields would open it up for much more programs. He indicated a lot of the traveling teams prefer to play on the larger fields. Councilor Harris reported the High School currently plays on one of the 200-ft. fields at Recreation Park, but would prefer to play on a 225-ft. field. He noted during the informational period it was the school district that was requesting the larger fields.

Councilor Ketchum asked if the men's slowpitch fields at Stan Hedwall get used much.

Mr. Osborn reported they're not used as much, noting one of the concepts that came from staff was to relocate those.

Councilor Ketchum suggested they revamp the current fields at Stan Hedwall into a softball complex rather than putting them in the middle of the park.

Mr. Skillings reported they chose the location in the middle because it's the highest point on the site. He noted they wanted to try to get above the 100 year floodplain, which would require less fill work.

Mr. Skillings reported both the school site and Stan Hedwall Park are feasible sites. He noted part of the study was to identify the pros and cons for the two alternative sites.

School site pros

- Will accommodate four 200-225-ft. fields and up to two additional 200-225-ft. fields
- Less time to develop
- Less cost to develop

School site cons:

- Will need an agreement to use the site
- Question of ownership, management, and scheduling of facility

Hedwall site pros:

- City owns the property
- All facilities would be at one location
- Can improve entire site as one project

Hedwall site cons:

- Permitting is complex and lengthy
- Located in the floodplain
- Cost to redo park is more than just relocating the ballfields

Councilor Ketchum asked, since Olympic School is being incorporated into the new school site, is there a way to develop the field currently behind the school into the two larger fields, or doing something to incorporate more fields to give us more options and space.

Mr. Skillings reported they looked at that site and he believed the two larger fields would fit; however, separating the fields was not looked at favorably.

City Manager MacReynold reported the School District did not seem to be favorably inclined to talk about that property being part of the city's project.

Mayor Dawes believed the school worked out something with the Youth Football for that location, which might be their hesitancy.

Councilor Lund asked if the School District was hesitant to put six fields on their property.

Mr. Skillings stated they talked briefly about putting in six fields, but the school staff said they would prefer more green space.

Councilor Lund asked if four 225-ft, fields would fit on the school site.

Mr. Skillings stated they would not.

Councilor Lund reported a lot of ball games are played in Olympia because Centralia doesn't have the fields to accommodate them. He was hoping our project would include some larger fields to help with that, so we could get those dollars here.

City Manager MacReynold stated Councilor Lund made a very good point. He reported when the Committee last met they received some insight from Public Facilities District Chairman Todd Chaput about the longer term prospects for more ballfields, and the possibility of accessing some additional funding to assist us. City Manager MacReynold noted their discussion was more around having bigger fields and looking longer term at the Stan Hedwall site.

City Manager MacReynold believed the focus of the School District was four 200-ft. fields, and the direction to the Committee was to have four fields.

Councilor Ketchum stated if they move the fields out of Recreation Park to the school site, they could turn two of the old fields into two 225-ft. fields. He felt this would bring in a whole different crowd than what they have with the smaller fields.

Councilor Pope stated why move the fields if they're not going to be improved or offer more than what we already have.

Councilor Ketchum suggested by moving the fields they could save a million plus dollars by not having to put in the extra drainage.

Councilor Pope stated, regardless of the fields, drainage will still need to be done at Recreation Park.

City Manager MacReynold reported if they leave the ballfields at Recreation Park it will require extensive drainage, but if they move them, it will be significantly less.

Mr. Skillings provided a brief summary of the next steps:

- Present the findings of the Feasibility Study to the School Board
- Present the findings of the Feasibility Study to the Chehalis Foundation (who paid for the study)
- Continue conversations with the School District about relocating ballfields to the school site
- Finalize the concepts and cost and bring back to council by June 2016
- Meet with the Chehalis Eagles on April 13 to discuss involvement with Penny Playground

Mr. Skillings reported the project schedule had to be revised to allow more time to work out the details of the project and what the cost will be if it's decided to move the fields to the school site. He noted the new milestone would put the levy request on the February 14, 2017, ballot.

Mr. Skillings reported they still plan to apply for the Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) grant and the Safe Routes to School grant to help fund the Recreation Park Project. He noted they contacted the RCO about moving the election date out to February 2017 and they indicated it would still fit their schedule from a funding standpoint. Mr. Skillings reported the construction schedule would not be affected by the new election date either.

Mr. Skillings talked briefly about the parking needs at Recreation Park. He noted the city is still in negotiations with Green Hill School regarding the use of their parking lot.

City Manager MacReynold reported the city has been talking about this for some time. He noted with Councilor Pope's help and Mr. Osborn's persistence, the city was able to make some real progress with Green Hill School and believed we will be able to provide additional parking this summer.

Mr. Skillings stated they were looking for council policy and direction on how to proceed on the following items:

- Green Hill Parking provide counter proposal to Green Hill School for the use of their parking lot
- School Site meet with the Chehalis School Board and the Chehalis Foundation to present the summary of Feasibility Study
- Schedule Revise the schedule to allow time to work out issues with the school, and move the election date to February 14, 2017

Mayor Dawes stated it seemed like the logical next steps.

Councilor Lund stated he didn't want to move forward unless they can get six fields. He noted he would like to be able to work with the city of Centralia to bring in other events, which will bring more money into the city.

Councilor Spahr stated he hoped the School District understands that they're serving the same public. He noted the city is looking at presenting a levy to the voters to build a project that might be on school owned property, which is going to serve all of Lewis County.

Mayor Dawes reported when you site school property, especially when you have matching funds involved, state law requires that there be a certain amount of area available for the students to be engaged in outside activities.

Councilor Pope reported the fields are used predominantly by school age kids and suggested the school needs to keep in mind that what the city is doing is for the population of the community that they're serving. He stated their efforts are geared toward the youth and the facilities will be for the betterment of the community.

The direction from the council was to continue on.

Mayor Dawes closed the work session at 6:12 p.m. and reopened the regular meeting.

9. <u>Executive Session</u>. Mayor Dawes closed the regular meeting at 6:12 p.m. and announced the council would be in executive session pursuant to RCW 42.30.110(1)(i) – potential litigation for approximately 30 minutes and there would be no decision following conclusion of the executive session.

Following conclusion of the executive session, Mayor Dawes reopened the regular meeting at 6:32 p.m., and there being no further business to come before the council, the meeting was immediately adjourned.

ISSUE

The city recently advertised for bids for the High Level Reservoir Replacement Project. The results of the bidding and a recommendation to award a contract are presented for the council's consideration. In addition, the administration is requesting the council authorize the city manager to execute an amendment to the engineering contract agreement to cover additional construction management services.

DISCUSSION

The High Level Reservoir Replacement Project is part of the city's six-year Water System Plan and consists of the construction of a new 150,000 gallon steel reservoir in McFadden Park. The project is funded by a Drinking Water Revolving State Fund (DWSRF) loan in the amount of \$555,500, with a term of 14 years, at 1.5%.

The low bid was received from T Bailey, Inc., of Anacortes, Washington, in the amount of \$718,837.20. The engineer's estimate for this project was \$672,000. Six bids were received and opened on March 17 and are summarized below.

In addition to the bid award of this project, the administration is also presenting an amendment to the engineering contract agreement with HDR Engineering, Inc. In October 2014, the city entered into an agreement with HDR for the design and construction management of the High Level Reservoir Replacement in the amount of \$250,000. The administration is requesting an additional \$82,500 for increased services related to the project. These services include additional costs for construction management, special testing and inspections, and project management assistance. The list of tasks and related costs can be found in the attached Amendment 1 - Scope of Services.

Due to the bids being higher than the engineer's estimate and the increased costs for construction management, the city submitted for an additional \$310,000 loan through DWSRF and was able to secure \$300,000. An amended loan agreement will be brought to council once the paperwork is received from DWSRF.

The administration recommends that the council award the High Level Reservoir Replacement Project to T Bailey, Inc., of Anacortes, Washington, in the amount of \$718,837.20, and authorize the city manager to execute Amendment No. 1 with HDR Engineering, Inc., in the amount of \$82,500 to provide additional engineering services required for the High Level Reservoir Replacement Project.

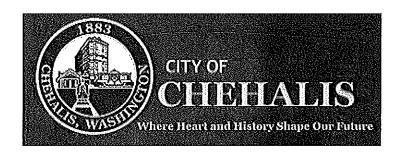

- 2. HWA will provide up to 2 hours labor to review submittals and RFIs; one site visit (8 hours labor) to observe reservoir subgrade for bearing capacity and observe placement of foundation structural fill; prepare site visit report.
- HGE will provide up to 10 days (80 hours) on-site services including soils sieves/proctors, subgrade compaction tests, concrete/rebar inspection, concrete compressive strength cylinders, visual and NDT/UT welding inspection.
- 4. NCE will provide up to 15 days on-site to inspect steel reservoir coating.

City Responsibilities

City will provide staff person(s) to provide onsite construction observation services. City staff
will assist in coordination and scheduling of construction testing, and review and accept
results.

Assumptions

- HDR staff will provide services in a supporting role to the City to monitor requirements of the
 contract documents. HDR's services will augment the City's role during construction. This
 scope of services does not include full time, on site observation by HDR or its
 subconsultants, but estimates limited support both on site and from our offices.
- Estimated construction duration is 4 months. No overtime is assumed. The actual duration
 of the construction phase is dependent upon contractor's schedule, weather, and other
 variable factors. If the Contractor(s) requires a longer schedule and City requires HDR to be

When on site, HDR has limited responsibility to observe construction activities to confirm work is in accordance with the contract documents and permit conditions, and will prepare appropriate reporting to document issues that need to be addressed. HDR will be in a supporting role to the City's on-site construction observer.

Project

ISSUE

The National Avenue Salzer Creek Bridge Scour Project is nearing the construction phase. Supplemental agreements are necessary for obligating construction funding, and amending the City's agreement with HDJ Design Group to include construction management. The administration is submitting the agreements for council review and consideration.

DISCUSSION

With the National Avenue Salzer Creek Bridge Scour Project nearing construction, the City must update supplemental agreements to reflect the status change. HDJ's original contract was for project management services, with the intention of adding construction management later. Supplemental Agreement #03 accomplishes this, with \$57,111.60 included for the construction phase. Additionally, Local Agency Agreement Supplement #4 obligates construction funding, which is a necessary step in the federal funding process. The Local Agency Federal Aid Prospectus is also updated to show construction funding.

RECOMMENDATION/COUNCIL ACTION DESIRED

The administration recommends that the city council authorize the city manager to execute a supplemental agreement with HDJ, PLLC for Construction Management Services for the National Avenue Salzer Creek Bridge Scour Project in the amount of \$57,711.60. The administration also recommends executing Local Agency Supplement #4 obligating construction funds, and updating the Local Agency Federal Aid Prospectus.

I move that the council authorize the city manager to execute a supplemental agreement with HDJ, PLLC for Construction Management Services for the National Avenue Salzer Creek Bridge Scour Project in the amount of \$57,711.60. General Description:

City of Chehalis (CITY) has asked HDJ Design Group, PLLC (CONSULTANT) to perform the construction inspection and management for the National Avenue Salzer Creek Project (PROJECT). CONSULTANT is proposing the additional scope items below to accommodate this extra work.

The additional work will involve, but not be limited to the following key tasks and deliverables:

- Submittal of Monthly Invoices to CITY for Services Performed
- Full Construction Management and Administration
- Review and Approval of Material Submittals
- Tracking and Issuance of Weekly Statements of Working Days
- Review, and reconcile Contractor Monthly Pay Estimates and Submittal to CITY for payment.
- Review Contractor Proposals for Alternate "Or Equal" Materials.
- Scheduling and Attendance -Weekly On-Site Construction Meetings
- As needed On-Site Construction Inspection
- Daily Inspection Reports
- Daily Bid Item Quantity Tracking

Assumptions:

The following assumptions are specific to the additional work involved with the PROJECT:

- 1) Paper copies of the contract plan sheets, project specific specifications and an engineer's estimate of costs will be provided by City of Chehalis.
- Contract plan sheets, project specific specifications and an engineer's estimate in electronic format. (Plans in pdf format, specifications in word format and an estimate in Excel format.)
- 3) Environmental and right of way documents will be furnished in pdf format.

4) Construction will begin no later than July 15th, 2015 and will be completed in the 40 working days allotted to the PROJECT, and the inspector will not be required for more than 20 overtime hours.

Sub-Task 6.1 – Contract Administration, Invoicing, and Progress Reports CONSULTANT will perform construction management services to include the following:

- 1) Prepare and submit monthly consultant invoices. No additional markup will be included in the billing by CONSULTANT.

- 8) CONSULTANT will review the Contractor's draft Monthly Pay Estimate. CONSULTANT will provide Monthly Pay Estimate to the CITY for review and approval. Assume a total of four monthly estimates plus the final estimate.
- 9) CONSULTANT will schedule, attend weekly on-site Construction Meetings and prepare meeting notes. Assume a total of 12 weekly on-site meetings.

Sub-Task 6.3 - Inspection Services

CONSULTANT shall provide part time on-site construction inspection services. The CONSULTANT'S Construction Inspector (INSPECTOR) will be the CONSULTANT Engineer's (ENGINEER) agent for the project and will act as directed by, and under the supervision of the ENGINEER. The INSPECTOR's oversight pertaining to the Contractor's work shall, in general, be with the ENGINEER and Contractor, keeping the CITY advised as necessary. The INSPECTOR's interaction with subcontractors shall only be through, or with, the full knowledge and approval of the Contractor. The INSPECTOR shall communicate with CITY, with the knowledge of and under the direction of the ENGINEER. The INSPECTOR responsibilities will include the following:

- INSPECTOR will serve as ENGINEER's liaison with Contractor, working principally through Contractor's superintendent, and assist in providing information regarding the intent of the Contract Documents.
- 2) INSPECTOR will assist in obtaining additional details or information from the CITY when required for proper execution of the work.
- 3) INSPECTOR will conduct on-site observation of the project to ensure all work is completed in accordance with the Contract Documents, and advise the CITY if any changed conditions are encountered.
- 4) INSPECTOR will coordinate in advance of scheduled major inspections, tests, systems startups and verify that appropriate CITY personnel are present, and that adequate records are kept for necessary testing.

- 5) INSPECTOR will prepare a daily inspector report recording all pertinent information such as: Contractor's hours on the site, weather conditions, and data relative to potential Change Orders, Field Orders, or changed conditions, site visitors, daily activities, and decisions.
- 6) INSPECTOR will immediately notify the CITY of any site accidents, emergencies, acts of God endangering the work, or damage to property.
- 7) INSPECTOR will review the contractor's pay estimates to ensure work being paid for has been completed. INSPECTOR will track and process materials-on-hand in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- 8) INSPECTOR will track bid item quantities daily.

VI. Payment and Partial Reimbursement

The total cost of the project, including all review and engineering costs and other expenses of the State, is to be paid by the Agency and by the Federal Government. Federal funding shall be in accordance with the Federal Transportation Act, as amended, 2 CFR Part 200. The State shall not be ultimately responsible for any of the costs of the project. The Agency shall be ultimately responsible for all costs associated with the project which are not reimbursed by the Federal Government. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed as a promise by the State as to the amount or nature of federal participation in this project.

The Agency shall bill the state for federal aid project costs incurred in conformity with applicable federal and state laws. The agency shall minimize the time elapsed between receipt of federal aid funds and subsequent payment of incurred costs. Expenditures by the Local Agency for maintenance, general administration, supervision, and other overhead shall not be eligible for federal participation unless a current indirect cost plan has been prepared in accordance with the regulations outlined in 2 CFR Part 200 - Uniform Admin Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, and retained for audit.

The State will pay for State incurred costs on the project. Following payment, the State shall bill the Federal Government for reimbursement of those costs eligible for federal participation to the extent that such costs are attributable and properly allocable to this project. The State shall bill the Agency for that portion of State costs which were not reimbursed by the Federal Government (see Section IX).

VII. Audit of Federal Consultant Contracts

The Agency, if services of a consultant are required, shall be responsible for audit of the consultant's records to determine eligible federal aid costs on the project. The report of said audit shall be in the Agency's files and made available to the State and the Federal Government.

An audit shall be conducted by the WSDOT Internal Audit Office in accordance with generally accepted governmental auditing standards as issued by the United States General Accounting Office by the Comptroller General of the United States; WSDOT Manual M 27-50, Consultant Authorization, Selection, and Agreement Administration; memoranda of understanding between WSDOT and FHWA; and 2 CFR Part 200.501 - Audit Requirements.

If upon audit it is found that overpayment or participation of federal money in ineligible items of cost has occurred, the Agency shall reimburse the State for the amount of such overpayment or excess participation.

VIII. Single Audit Act

The Agency, as a subrecipient of federal funds, shall adhere to the federal regulations outlined in 2 CFR Part 200.501 as well as all applicable federal and state statutes and regulations. A subrecipient who expends \$750,000 or more in federal awards from all sources during a given fiscal year shall have a single or program-specific audit performed for that year in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200.501. Upon conclusion of the audit, the Agency shall be responsible for ensuring that a copy of the report is transmitted promptly to the State.

IX. Payment of Billing

The Agency agrees that if payment or arrangement for payment of any of the State's billing relative to the project (e.g., State force work, project cancellation, overpayment, cost ineligible for federal participation, etc.) is not made to the State within 45 days after the Agency has been billed, the State shall effect reimbursement of the total sum due from the regular monthly fuel tax allotments to the Agency from the Motor Vehicle Fund. No additional Federal project funding will be approved until full payment is received unless otherwise directed by the Director of Local Programs.

Project Agreement End Date - This date is based on your projects Period of Performance (2 CFR Part 200.309). Any costs incurred after the Project Agreement End Date are NOT eligible for federal reimbursement. All eligible costs incurred prior to the Project Agreement End Date must be submitted for reimbursement within 90 days after the Project Agreement End Date or they become ineligible for federal reimbursement.

XVII. Assurances

Local Agencies receiving Federal funding from the USDOT or its operating administrations (i.e., Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration) are required to submit a written policy statement, signed by the Agency Executive and addressed to the State, documenting that all programs, activities and services will be conducted in compliance with Section 504 and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

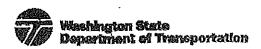

ISSUE

Discover! Children's Museum (DCM) is desirous of applying for \$75,000 in grant funding for development of the "green space" adjacent to the proposed location of the Discover! Children's Museum. The grant application must be submitted by the city as the property owner, and must provide for a 50% local match that will be funded by DCM.

DISCUSSION

The land to be leased for construction of an 18,000 square foot facility is located adjacent to 1.57 acres of land designated as "future green space." DCM would like to develop and maintain the green space parcel for its use, as well as the use of the general public, enhancing the local benefit of the project.

The Chehalis city council has been very supportive of the project and in February 2014, directed the City Manager to work with DCM to draft a lease agreement that would allow DCM to lease the property for placement of a museum. DCM envisions a long-term lease (an initial 20-year term, plus up to six additional five-year terms) and to rent the space for fair market value.

DCM would develop, improve, and maintain the green space, including parking that would be open to the public. A relatively small portion of the green space would be used exclusively for some outdoor exhibits and a play area for the museum.

The DCM Board of Directors has been working with the contracted grant writers over the past several weeks. The grant writers are familiar with elements of the grant that make it attractive to the reviewers, and the DCM Board has identified project components to achieve higher scores by the review team.

It is important to the DCM Board that the space is eye-catching from the freeway and surrounding area; that it is safe – well-lit and fenced; that it provides outside access to indoor restrooms; and that it not be duplicative of other public parks/spaces in the area. The space will include parking, landscaping with native trees and plants, walking paths, and seating and picnic areas.

Major components that will be incorporated include:

- natural habitat areas to attract such creatures as bugs, butterflies, and birds.
- a flexible, outdoor space for activities and performances.
- a sensory area for children with special needs.
- educational signage. As you may recall, DCM's priority is to provide a facility where children learn through play, and this mission will be carried into the green space.

A complete list of proposed features and estimated budget is attached to this report.

The grant application process requires that the city adopt a resolution as a component of the application package. The resolution must contain text specified by the RCO in order to be acceptable. Resolution No. 9-2016 (attached) has been drafted to satisfy the RCO criteria. Since the application is due May 2, it is requested that the council adopt the resolution on first and final reading.

RECOMMENDATION / COUNCIL ACTION DESIRED

The administration recommends that the council adopt Resolution No. 9-2016 authorizing the City Manager to apply for an RCO grant for \$75,000 for development of the "green space" property adjacent to the future Discover! Children's Museum using DCM funding for the 50% local match.

RESOLUTION NO. 09-2016

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CHEHALIS, WASHINGTON, AUTHORIZING THE APPLICATION FOR A RECREATION AND CONSERVATION OFFICE GRANT (LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND) FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF LAND WITHIN THE CHEHALIS-CENTRALIA AIRPORT RETAIL DEVELOPMENT AREA.

WHEREAS, This Resolution authorizes submitting applications for grant funding assistance for Land and Water Conservation Fund projects to the Recreation and Conservation Office as provided in Title 16, USC, chapter 4601-4 as amended; WAC 286 and subsequent Legislative action; and

WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis has approved a comprehensive parks and recreation plan that includes this project; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) program, state grant assistance is requested to aid in financing the cost of improvement of land within the Chehalis-Centralia Airport retail development area; and

WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis considers it in the best public interest to complete the project described in the application; now, therefore,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHEHALIS, WASHINGTON, DO HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1.</u> The city manager is authorized to make formal application to the Recreation and Conservation Office for grant assistance.
- <u>Section 2.</u> Any grant assistance received will be used for direct costs associated with implementation of the project referenced above.
- Section 3. The City of Chehalis hereby certifies that the matching share of project funding will be derived from the Discover! Children's Museum, a 501(c)3 not for profit organization, and that Discover! Children's Museum is responsible for supporting all non-cash commitments to this project should they not materialize.
- <u>Section 4.</u> We acknowledge that the grant assistance, if approved, will be paid on a reimbursement basis, meaning we will only request payment from the Recreation and Conservation Office after eligible and allowable costs have been incurred and payment remitted to our vendors, and that the Recreation and Conservation Office will hold retainage until the project is deemed complete.
- <u>Section 5.</u> We acknowledge that any facility development through grant assistance from the Recreation and Conservation Funding Board must be reasonably maintained and made available to the general public at reasonable hours and times of the year according to the type of area or facility unless other restrictions have been agreed to by the Recreation and Conservation Office Director or the Recreation and Conservation Funding Board and the National Park Service.

<u>Section 6.</u> We acknowledge that any facility developed with grant assistance from the Recreation and Conservation Funding Board must be dedicated for public outdoor recreation purposes, and be retained and maintained for such use for perpetuity unless otherwise provided and agreed to by our organization and the Recreation and conservation Funding Board and the National Park Service.

<u>Section 7.</u> We have read both the federal guidelines and state policies for the LWCF program and agree to abide by those guidelines and policies, and as LWCF grants are federal funds, our organization must comply with all applicable federal laws.

<u>Section 8.</u> This resolution becomes part of a formal application to the Recreation and Conservation Office for grant assistance.

Section 9. We provided appropriate opportunity for public comment on this application.

ISSUE

The Chehalis-Centralia Airport would like to purchase fill that is available as a result of ongoing construction for Sonic Drive-In. Kugel Construction is removing fill from another location in Olympia and has excess fill available for purchase at a reduced market price, primarily due to equipment already in use.

DISCUSSION

In order to continue development with the Twin City Town Center an access road is required off of NW Arkansas Way to service Tract 6, Dutch Brothers, and the larger Tract, 7. Constructing the easement with airport funds will reduce the costs for businesses desiring to locate in the Twin City Town Center Development.

Kugel Construction is currently moving fill from a future Sonic Drive-In location to Chehalis for the ongoing construction of a Sonic location on NW Arkansas Way. Kugel Construction has offered to fill and compact the area for the access road referenced above. Kugel Construction will place 1600 tons of crushed rock and 7,000 cubic yards of fill at the site for a cost not to exceed \$85,000. The administration believes this can be covered within the airport's existing budget with some minor adjustments. Given that Kugel Construction has a work force and equipment already mobilized for construction of the Sonic Drive-In, no mobilization costs are required to fill and compact the access road for the airport. To initiate the purchase, a resolution authorizing a sole source purchase of fill for council's consideration.

RECOMMENDATION/COUNCIL ACTION DESIRED

The administration recommends that the council adopt Resolution No. 11-2016 on first and final reading authorizing a sole source purchase of fill for the Chehalis-Centralia Airport.

Section 1. The bidding requirements for the purchase of fill are hereby waived.

Section 2. The Airport Manager is authorized to purchase fill from Kugel Construction of Chehalis, WA for an amount, including sales tax, not to exceed \$85,000.

ISSUE

Ordinance No. 957-B, amending the 2016 Budget, is hereby submitted to reflect the changes in estimates and the actual activity of the City. It is necessary to ensure compliance with appropriation requirements achieve a realistic budget.

DISCUSSION

The attached spreadsheet provides information on a line-by-line basis, as well as summary information of the proposed budget amendment. A few items have been added since the first reading. The additions include:

- A \$6,000 appropriation for updating the city's website
- A \$5,025 increase in estimated revenue for recently funded multimodal transportation activities
- The estimated revenue and related appropriations increase related to the TIB funded National Avenue Grind & Overlay Project
- A transfer of funds from the Wastewater Fund to the Airport Fund for Arkansas Way expenses

The net city-wide increase to fund balances totals \$25,469. The new estimated total ending fund balance will be \$14,034,624. This ordinance is presented for council consideration on the second of two required readings.

RECOMMENDATION/COUNCIL ACTION DESIRED

The administration recommends that the council pass Ordinance No. 957-B on second and final reading.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>957-B</u>

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CHEHALIS, WASHINGTON, AMENDING THE ANNUAL BUDGET OF THE CITY FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 2016, BY INCREASING APPROPRIATIONS OF THE GENERAL FUND IN THE SUM OF FOUR HUNDRED NINE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY DOLLARS (\$409,460); AND THE DEDICATED STREET FUND IN THE SUM OF FOUR HUNDRED NINETY-TWO THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED SIXTY (\$492,260); AND THE BOND FUND IN THE SUM OF FOUR HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$425); AND THE AIRPORT FUND IN THE AMOUNT OF THIRTY-TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$32,500); AND DECREASING APROPRIATIONS OF THE WASTEWATER FUND BY EIGHTY FOUR THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED TWENTY-NINE DOLLARS (\$84,329); AND DIRECTING THE MANAGER TO EFFECT THE BUDGET FINANCE AMENDMENTS HEREIN PROVIDED.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHEHALIS, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to increase the General Fund's estimated revenues by \$92,025; increase transfers in by \$18,000; increase transfers out by \$425; and increase appropriations by \$409,460.
- Section 2. The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to increase the Dedicated Street Fund's estimated revenues by \$442,260; and increase appropriations by \$492,260.
- **Section 3.** The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to increase the Bond Fund's transfers in by \$425 and increase appropriations by \$425.
- Section 4. The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to decrease the Wastewater Fund's appropriations by \$84,329; and increase transfers out by \$32,500.
- **Section 5.** The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to increase the Water Fund's estimate revenues by \$909,000.
- Section 6. The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to increase the Storm and Surface Water Fund's transfers out by \$18,000.

Section 7. The annual budget of the city for the calendar year 2016 shall be, and the same hereby is, amended so as to increase the Airport Fund's appropriations by \$32,500; and increase transfers in by \$32,500.

Section 8. Attached hereto and identified as Exhibit A, in summary form, are the total of estimated revenues, transfers in, expenditures, and transfers out for each separate fund and the aggregate totals for all such funds combined for the city for the amended 2016 budget which, shows a total estimated ending fund balance of \$14,304,624.

ISSUE

Twin Transit is seeking a resolution from the City Council pledging city support for State and Federal capital funding assistance necessary for the purchase, design and construction of a Regional Transit Center.

DISCUSSION

On November 23, 2015, Twin Transit General Manager Rob LaFontaine briefed the council on a proposed property acquisition to build a combined bus transfer center/transit office building. During the discussion it was noted that Twin Transit had money in their capital program earmarked for facility improvements and it was their intent to utilize a portion of those funds primarily for the property acquisition and look at Regional Mobility grants to build the facility.

Twin Transit has an opportunity to apply for Federal funds through the U. S. Department of Transportation-Federal Transit Administration. Grant applications for these funds need to be submitted by May 13 in order to be considered. Twin Transit also intends to apply for state controlled Regional Mobility grant funds in October. In either case, local support for the project will be an important element to grant evaluators. Attached for council consideration is Resolution No. 10-2016.

RECOMMENDATION/COUNCIL ACTION DESIRED

The administration recommends that the council consider Resolution No. 10-2016 on first and final reading, supporting Twin Transit's request for State and Federal funds necessary for the construction of a Regional Transit Center.

SUBJECT: Ordinance No. 958-B, First Reading - Establishing a Zero-Rise Policy for

Development in the Floodplain

ISSUE

The city of Chehalis, along with other local communities, has experienced significant flooding in the recent history of the Chehalis Basin, and with climate change, there appears to be an increased potential for more severe flooding. The city also recognizes its important relationship as a partner, contributor, and solver of flood damage reduction and fish habitat issues within and among the Chehalis Basin Flood Authority.

Additionally, the city also recognizes the critical role and contribution that development and the business community have in the city.

DISCUSSION

Attached for council consideration is Ordinance No. 958-B. The proposed ordinance establishes a Zero-Rise Policy that would limit the impact downstream caused by fill in the Chehalis floodplain. The proposed ordinance would require any fill greater than 500 cubic yards include a P.E. stamped engineering report identifying the impact to the Base Flood Elevation (BFE). If the report shows a rise in the BFE, the applicant will have to mitigate by providing a compensatory excavation site at a location secured by the applicant. In lieu of compensatory excavation, the applicant may contribute funds for flood mitigation or aquatic species enhancement projects within the Chehalis River floodplain. The list of projects and fees will be developed and presented to council in resolution form at a future council meeting.

It is the city of Chehalis' intent that the Zero-Rise Policy will limit the impact to our partners downstream, while allowing development to continue within the city of Chehalis floodplain without being overly burdensome.

RECOMMENDATION/COUNCIL ACTION DESIRED

The administration recommends that the council pass Ordinance No. 958-B on first reading, establishing a Zero-Rise Policy for development within the city of Chehalis floodplain.

SUGGESTED MOTION

ORDINANCE NO. 958-B

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CHEHALIS, WASHINGTON, ESTABLISHING A ZERO-RISE POLICY, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

- **WHEREAS**, the City of Chehalis has experienced significant flood events in the recent history of the Chehalis Basin; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis recognizes that with climate change there appears to be an increased potential for the increased severity of flooding in the Chehalis Basin; and
- **WHEREAS,** the City of Chehalis has been an active member of the Chehalis Flood Authority since its inception in 2008; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis recognizes its important relationship as a partner, contributor, and solver of flood damage reduction and fish habitat issues within and among the Chehalis Basin Flood Authority and our many communities; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis recognizes construction fill is commonly associated with development within a city, and at times fill may occur in the 100 year floodplain and may have an impact upon our citizens, businesses and Chehalis Basin partners; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis is establishing a "Zero-Rise Policy" within the approved floodplain in its efforts to create no significant impact downstream caused by fill in the floodplain; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City of Chehalis has determined that the boundary of the flood of record as mapped by the Chehalis Basin Flood Authority shall serve as the boundary map for the 100 year floodplain; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Chehalis recognizes the critical role and contribution the development and business community have in the City and a "Zero-Rise Policy" should not be overly burdensome. NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHEHALIS, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1</u>. AN ORDINANCE establishing a "Zero-Rise Policy" within the approved floodplain within the city shall exist to limit the impact downstream caused by fill in the floodplain and is established by Ordinance under Section 17.22.035 of the Chehalis Municipal Code.
- <u>Section 2</u>. AN ORDINANCE relating to fill and a zero net rise in the base flood elevation (BFE) within the 100 year floodplain as identified by the flood of record flood boundary map created by the Chehalis Flood Authority; and adding CMC 17.22.035.

17.22.035 Zero-Rise Policy

- (a) A "Zero-Rise Policy" means any project in a floodplain must be reviewed to determine to not increase flood heights.
- (b) Any fill material over 500 cubic yards cumulatively placed within a floodplain shall require compensatory excavation necessary to achieve zero net rise.
- (c) Any fill greater than 500 cubic yards as measured cumulatively within the 100 year floodplain shall require a P.E. stamped engineering report identifying the findings on the impact of the BFE in terms of impacting the height of the BFE based on the proposed fill project. The engineer will evaluate the impact referencing the latest HEC-RAS hydraulic modeling or other available modeling consistent with current hydraulic modeling.
- (d) If an engineering report shows a rise in the BFE, the applicant shall provide compensatory excavation. The compensatory site must remain as a compensatory site in perpetuity. However, if the fill site is behind the airport levee, the compensatory site must function as such, or until the levee is raised utilizing NGVD29 with a BFE of 182 feet. It shall be the applicant's responsibility to obtain a compensatory fill site and secure such site prior to commencing fill.
 - (e) The compensatory fill site shall be recorded as such with the Lewis County Auditor.
- (f) The requirement of compensatory fill is waived if an engineering report is provided from a professional engineer stating there will be no rise in the BFE due to the proposed fill. The report shall be stamped by the P.E.
- (g) If the engineering report shows a rise in the BFE due to the proposed fill, in lieu of compensatory fill, the applicant may contribute funds for flood mitigation or aquatic species enhancement projects within the Chehalis River floodplain, so long as the projects are on the Chehalis River and its associated floodplain within the City of Chehalis limits. The City of Chehalis shall establish by resolution a list of Chehalis Basin Flood Authority approved projects and a formula for contribution to fund such projects.
